


Avalon Quickstep

This tune was recorded by Narmour & Smith in 1930 and has a 10-bar B part; the version here comes from the playing of the Arm and Hammer String Band. Avalon MS, after which the tune is named, is also famous as the home town of country bluesman Mississippi John Hurt.

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


Hop High Ladies

This is the descendant of the Scottish tune "Miss McLeod's Reel." It was recorded in 1926 by the North Carolina Ramblers under the title "Mountain Reel." The version here is my own composite of a few different settings.



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


Tennessee Wagoner


Found everywhere form Arkansas to upstate New York, this tune had a fill-in-the-blank title like "Buffalo Gals" and hence turns up with various state names. Note that in the fourth bar of the B part you have to bend the 3-draw reed down a whole step. This was the first tune fiddled by Uncle Jimmy Thompson over Nashville's WSM Barn Dance, the show that later became the Grand Ole Opry, on November 18, 1925. Transcribed from the fiddling of April Verch.

C-Harmonica, Paddy Richter, bottom row.


Traditional, Arr. G. Weiser
