INTRODUCTION TO BUCKET DRUMMING

Bucket drumming is fun. That is a given. But it can also be musical, promote teamwork, teach basic percussion technique, and lead to other musical activities like marching bands. So, let's begin.

25-LITRE PLASTIC BUCKET



Where to start? The obvious answer is to get a bucket. Most bucket drumming is done using a 25-litre plastic bucket, sometimes called a tenor drum.

It is placed on the ground with the bottom at the top. Remove the wire handle so it does not rattle. Most buckets can be purchased for less than £10, or you could get some donated. Of course, clean thoroughly before using.

WOODEN DRUMSTICKS



There are choices for what to use to strike the bucket. One solution is to purchase pairs of drumsticks (available for less than £5 in most music shops). It is recommended to use drumsticks with wood beads or tips so they will not possibly fly off like plastic-tip drumsticks.

One advantage of drumsticks is that they can be played using the tip, the middle called the shoulder and the fatter end called the butt. The more tones you can produce striking a bucket, the better. Wooden dowels can be used for playing bucket drums as well, or even rhythm sticks.



BUCKET DRUM WARM-UP 4




The lyrics for Taylor Swift's "Shake It Off" empower you to not worry about what other people think. The accompaniment is built over a bed of sounds directly from a marching band drumline. The original recording even features stick clicks!

The sounds and rhythms of the bucket drum part build on the previous arrangements. No new tones are introduced and many of the rhythms have already been played.

OFF BEAT STICK CLICKS

The first stick click rhythm is featured in Warm-Up 4; playing on the off beats. One helpful movement to reinforce this rhythm is to move your hands out on the rests and inward on beats 2 and 4.



BASS TONE & RIM

The first rhythm played on the bucket drum begins with a rhythm that was featured in "I Got You (I Feel Good)" for one bar. This is followed by a bar of bass-rim-bass-rim forming a two-bar phrase.
