This song was recorded almost completely 'a cappella', with the exception of a bass guitar as the only instrument accompanying Joel's many vocal tracks. Form his 1993 album, An Innocent Man, Loed originally wanted this song performed with a vocal group, but due to availability issues, he ended up singing all the tracks himself. In order to avoid having the same vocal tone on every track, loel invented characters for each part to vary his performances!

Hints & Tips: This song is in 2/2: two minims/half notes per bar, so it needs to feel like it's in 'two' rather than 'four'. At the same time, it shouldn't sound rushed; it should roll along in a relaxed style.







### Piano Man

#### Words and Music by Billy Joel

When his debut album, Cold Spring Harbor, didn't do too well in the charts in 1971, Joel was forced to find work and played for six months at The Executive Room piano bar in Los Angeles. During this time, Joel got to know the regulars and wrote 'Piano Man' about his time in the residency, including stories of real people he met at the venue. The Executive Room has since been demolished and a strip mall built in its place.

Hints & Tips: This song is in 'three', so it feels a bit like a pop waltz. The left hand can be reduced to just one note in most bars if you find that easier, although take care in places where the left hand needs to supply a melody note, e.g., in bars 16-17.

# She's Always a Woman

Joel's relationship with first wife, Elizabeth Weber, started out as an affair, as Weber was married to Joel's drummer at the time, Jon Small. After Small discovered the affair, Weber wasn't seen for several weeks, leaving Joel heartbroken, before her return to him and their consequent marriage. This song was written about Weber, who rallied against traditional gender roles of the time, becoming Joel's manager and working in a male-dominabed industry with great success for a number of years.

Hints & Tips: Once you're comfortable with the notes of this song, you can take it a little faster, so it feels like 'one-in-a-bar'. Take care with the flats at the bottom of the third page. It feels quite far away from the home key at this point. Listening to the song would be a good idea.
